**Public Health & Safety Committee Meeting**

**Public Health & Safety Committee Members:** Commissioner and Committee Chair Charles M. Whiting, Commissioner R. Samuel Valenza, Commissioner Nicolas O. Scull, Andy Block, Chief of Police, John Fugelo, Captain/Emergency Services/Fire Marshall, Kenneth E. Davidson, Assistant Chief of Operations & Administration at Second Alarmer's Rescue Squad

- I. **Call to order:** Commissioner and Committee Chair Whiting called the meeting to order via Zoom following adjournment of the Parks and Recreation Committee Meeting.
- II. **Roll Call:** Commissioner and Committee Chair Whiting, Commissioners Valenza and Scull; Also present: Chief Block, Captain Fugelo, Chief Davidson, Fire Chief Chuck Jones, Jr. Also present: Matthew H. Candland, Township Manager, and Alex Baumler, Township Solicitor.
- III. **Approval of Minutes** - July 20, 2020 - The meeting minutes were unanimously approved as submitted.
- IV. **Acceptance and approval of the following monthly reports:**
  - A. Police Department – Memorandum and Monthly Reports for July and August 2020:
    - Chief Block reviewed crime statistics, department activities, legislative updates, traffic activity, investigations, and discussed reminders.
  - B. Department of Emergency Services:
    - Captain Fugelo reviewed call statistics, activities and trainings.
    - Commissioner Spearing inquired on the status of grant applications for Fire School training. Captain Fugelo replied that Willow Grove Fire Department is working to combine efforts with Lower Moreland.
  - C. Second Alarmer's Association and Rescue Squad - Chief Davidson reviewed calls and response statistics, legislative updates, and trainings.
    - Commissioner Spearing inquired on the direct pay legislation. Chief Davidson replied that discussions on Bill 1347 have progressed through the Committee, however, formal action remains to be taken.
  - D. Willow Grove Volunteer Fire Company - Chief Jones discussed the following:
    - Safety tips on home heating systems, space heaters, fireplaces, firepits, and recommended installing carbon monoxide detectors.

IX. **Commissioner Comments:**

- Commissioner Spearing commented concerns on sign littering in an effort to avoid pollution and establish respect for the Township, and stated that the Solicitor's office is working on enforcing the issue with legal citations and fines.
- Commissioner Scull stated that the polling location for Ward 1 remains undetermined and recommended using the Fire House. Mr. Candland replied that he will follow up on the location.
- Commissioner Whiting stated that Calvary Presbyterian Church is the polling location for Ward 3-1 and Ward 3-2.
- Commissioner Scull inquired about security at the polling locations. Chief Block replied that it is a priority, directed patrols will maintain the areas, and he will provide more information.

**Upper Moreland Police**  
**September 2020 Monthly Report**

The Upper Moreland Police Department responded to 1,101 call for service for the month of September 2020. The total calls for service for the year as of September 30, 2020 is 10,292.

While the COVID-19 restrictions remain in place the call volume is down from the previous month of September by 146 calls. The police department's call volume is down just under 1% when compared to September of 2019. Total call volume, compared year-to-date with September 2019, remains down at 4%.

The following Part-One Crimes were reported and investigated by Upper Moreland Police in September;

- 16 Theft Investigations with four cleared by arrest

The following Part-Two crimes were reported to Upper Moreland Police in September;

- 11 narcotics offenses cleared by arrest
- Two Public Intoxications offenses cleared by arrest
- 28 other crimes committed with clearance by arrest
- Four DUI Investigations

The Patrol Division conducted the following traffic activity and enforcement;

- 408 Vehicle Investigations
- 40 Hazardous Traffic Violations
- 84 Non-Hazardous Traffic Violations

The Traffic Unit conducted the follow investigations, activities, and studies;

- Eight Traffic and Parking Problems

**Detective Bureau/CID**

The Detective Bureau opened 27 new cases in the month of September. The following are active criminal investigations during the month:

- One Prostitution Investigation
- Two Aggravated Assault
- Two Child Abuse/Neglect
- Two Juvenile Sexting Investigations
- Three Theft Investigations
- Two Ethnic Intimidation Investigations
- Seven Narcotics Investigations

I am happy to report that we saw a reduction in Part One Crimes for September of 2020. The only Part One Crimes reported were 16 thefts with a majority of those being retail theft offenses from our large retail stores within the township.

We continue to see a reduction in the following crimes most likely due to the COVID-19 restrictions:

- Burglaries have decreased by 64% between September 2019 and September 2020 YTD.
- Thefts have decreased by 15% between September 2019 and September 2020 YTD.

## Community Oriented Policing Activities

The Upper Moreland Police Department participated in the following Community Oriented Policing Activities in the month of September 2020.

On September 5, 2020 Sergeant Pam Cordura's squad conducted a birthday parade celebration for Mr. Wooten who turned 60 years old. Officers Bald and Kidd provided the escort to the Wooten residence. Once the escort was completed Mrs. Wooten requested Officers Bald and Kidd to stop into her residence. While at the residence Officers Bald and Kidd spoke with several members of the family. During these discussions the family discussed race relations between the minority communities and law enforcement. The family further related to our officers that interactions such as the birthday party escort with the African American community are very helpful in removing barriers between the police and community. The Wooten's believe that this act of support shows our commitment to all members of the community. This is a tremendous example and opportunity for our officers to further engage all members of Upper Moreland through our community outreach as Officer Bald, Kidd and Sergeant Cordura accomplished. Excellent work and thank you for your commitment to serve our communities of Upper Moreland Township.

On September 16, 2020 Chief Block and Lieutenant Troxel attended the September 2020 Upper Moreland School District safe schools meeting. The meeting is a collaboration between with the school district and police department to maintain situational awareness, notification protocols, critical incident management, and training initiatives. The September meeting focused on the police department facilitating table-top exercises with UMTSD administrators and faculty. This critical training is in the planning stages and will be held within the next few months.

On September 16, 2020 Chief Block met with Dr. Michael Roth, the new Upper Moreland School District Superintendent. The focus of this meeting was to establish a strong working relationship between the police department and school district. Several initiatives were discussed during the meeting, including officers providing daily visits to the schools, education programs presented by Upper Moreland Police officers, as well as, notification protocols. Discussion also ensued on information exchange on the upcoming graduated reopening of the school district. Specifically, with the transition from virtual learning back to classroom instruction.

On September 23, 2020 Chief Block met virtually with Mrs. Alison Ferren, Interim President and Chief Operating Officer of Abington Memorial Hospital. This meeting was to discuss diversity and inclusion initiatives for the communities served by Upper Moreland Police and Abington Memorial Hospital. Mrs. Ferren would like to organize a roundtable discussion with local law enforcement agencies and police departments to discuss and collaborate on diversity within the local communities.

***Good Afternoon,***

***I was at Weis off of County Line Road today and witnessed something that might appear simple but reminded me of the role police officers have in community connection. There was a police officer parked in his cruiser and he was talking to one of the Weis employees who often works outside with shopping cart management. They appeared to be having more than just a brief conversation. As a nurse I observed the young man to have behaviors typical of a person with autism. He obviously felt comfortable talking to this police officer and they appeared to have an established acquaintance. With the negativity currently discussed about police departments, the scene I witnessed highlights the small acts that make the police feel like they are there for us. They will stop and have a chat at the grocery store. They get to know people of all abilities so if there is a call and it is mental health related they might know the person or know how to interact with them in a positive way based on other relationships they've developed. I just wanted to share that something that might've seemed every day was touching to me. The officer also waved to me which I think is another great way to let people know police don't just see people who are committing crimes and it lets the community know they are approachable if they're needed.***

### Steps to Take when Trick or Treating

Traditional Halloween activities are fun, but some can increase the risk of getting or spreading [COVID-19](#) or [influenza](#). Plan alternate ways to participate in Halloween.

#### Make trick-or-treating safer

- Avoid direct contact with trick-or-treaters.
- Give out treats outdoors, if possible.
- Set up a station with individually bagged treats for kids to take.
- Wash hands before handling treats.
- Wear a mask.



## Wear a mask

- Make your cloth **mask** part of your costume.
- A costume mask is **not** a substitute for a cloth mask.
- Do **NOT** wear a costume mask over a cloth mask. It can make breathing more difficult.
- Masks should **NOT** be worn by children under the age of 2 or anyone who has trouble breathing



## Stay at least 6 feet away from others who do not live with you

- Indoors and outdoors, you are more likely to get or spread COVID-19 when you are in close contact with others for a long time.

## Wash your hands

- Bring **hand sanitizer** with you and use it after touching objects or other people.
- Use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.
- Parents: supervise young children using hand sanitizer.

- Wash hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds when you get home and before you eat any treats.




## Steps to Take for Other Halloween Activities

Enjoy Halloween activities and take steps to protect yourself from getting or spreading COVID-19.

### Remember to always

- Wear a cloth **mask**
- Indoors and outdoors, stay at least 6 feet away from others who do not live with you
- Wash your hands or use **hand sanitizer** frequently



### Decorate and carve pumpkins

- Decorate your home for Halloween.
- Carve pumpkins with members of your household or outside with neighbors or friends.

- Walk from house to house, admiring Halloween decorations at a distance.



## Visit an orchard, forest, or corn maze. Attend a scavenger hunt.

- Go on an outdoor Halloween-themed scavenger hunt.
- Visit a pumpkin patch or orchard. Remember to wash your hands or use hand sanitizer frequently, especially after touching frequently touched surfaces, pumpkins, or apples.
- Go to a one-way, walk-through haunted forest or corn maze.



## Other Ideas

- Hide Halloween treats in and around your house. Hold a Halloween treat hunt with household members.
- Hold an outdoor costume parade or contest so everyone can show off their costumes.
- Host an outdoor Halloween movie night with friends or neighbors or an indoor movie night with your household members.

## Chapter 330. Vehicles and Traffic

### Article III. Parking Regulations

#### § 330-15. Parking prohibited at all times.

Parking shall be prohibited at all times in the following locations, on that side that has been duly posted with official signs.
