Edward Glassman Named New Upper Moreland Township Fire Chief

Upper Moreland Township Board of Commissioners and Township Manager Matthew Candland announced Edward Glassman as Upper Moreland Township's new Fire Chief. The Township welcomed Chief Glassman to fill the newly created Fire Chief position on Monday, January 3, 2022.

Chief Glassman has over thirty years in Fire Service bringing a wealth of knowledge and experience to the Upper Moreland Township Fire Department. Chief Glassman began his career with the City of Camden in 1986 as a police officer. In 1991, he transferred to Fire Service. During his tenure at the City of Camden he served as a Firefighter, Fire Captain, Battalion Fire Chief and Deputy Fire Chief/Emergency Management Coordinator. Chief Glassman retired from the City of Camden in 2020 after 34 years of service. Following his retirement he worked as the Emergency Management Specialist for Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). In addition, Chief Glassman has 20 years of service as a volunteer Firefighter in a combination fire department in Gloucester City, New Jersey.

Chief Glassman graduated from Neumann University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Public Safety Administration and has a Master of Administrative Science degree from Fairleigh Dickinson University. In addition to numerous ongoing educational and advancement training he attends; Chief Glassman is a certified Emergency Manager and has his FEMA Professional Development and Advance Professional Development Certifications.

Asked to provide a statement about his new role, Chief Glassman, stated, "I am honored for the opportunity to be selected as the new Fire Chief and I am excited to be part of the great team providing Fire Services to Upper Moreland Township. I appreciate the confidence the Board of Commissioners and Township Manager Matt Candland have in me. I want to build a strong organization to service the needs of the community. I look forward to serving the businesses and citizens of Upper Moreland and hope to speak to all of you soon."

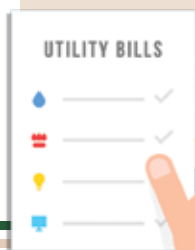

Historical Commission In July of 2001, the Upper Moreland Board of Commissioners passed an Historic Preservation Ordinance to encourage preservation of sites significant to the history and development of the Township and to establish a Historical Commission chartered with administering that ordinance and developing an Inventory of Historical Properties.

Human Relations Commission Established by Ordinance #1696 at the October 5, 2020 Regular Meeting of the Board of Commissioners, to prohibit discrimination in employment, housing, commercial property and public accommodations within the Township.

Parks and Recreation Advisory Council The Board of Commissioners by resolution dated April 11, 1972, created a committee to advise and aid the Board in connection with the Parks and Recreation programs in the community.

Police and Fire Civil Service Commission The Civil Service Commission is an oversight board created by the Board of Commissioners for the purpose of overseeing the hiring and promotion process within the Township Police and Fire Departments, as required by the Pennsylvania First Class Township Code.

Transportation Impact Advisory Committee The Committee serves in an advisory capacity and develops land use assumptions, conducts roadway sufficiency analysis studies, and makes recommendations as to the development of road improvements, capital improvements, and impact fees within the Township.

Uniform Construction Code Local Appeals Board Established by the Board of Commissioners, to carry out its interests in promoting public health and safety, the Appeals Board hears appeals, requests for variances or extensions of time under the provisions of the Uniform Construction Code and authorizes other necessary action.

Zoning Hearing Board The Board of Commissioners shall appoint by resolution five residents of the Township, none of whom shall hold any other office in the Township, to serve as the Zoning Hearing Board of the Township, each member serving a term of not more than five years in length, with the terms staggered so that the term of office of one member shall expire each year.



TOWNSHIP PURCHASES OLD WOODLAWN SCHOOL AND IS AWARDED LARGE GRANTS FOR IMPROVEMENTS TO THE WILLOW GROVE INTERCHANGE AND FARMSTEAD PARK

Old Woodlawn School

Last fall the Township purchased the old Woodlawn School. The former school, located at the intersection of Woodlawn and Division Avenues, was most recently used as a church but has effectively been vacant for the past few years. Because the dilapidated school is situated in the middle of an established neighborhood and has negatively impacted this neighborhood, the Township felt that acquiring the school was in the best interest of our community.

The Township plans to demolish the old school and incorporate the land on which the school was situated into the existing Woodlawn Park. Demolition is expected to begin this spring (2022). Given the required environmental remediation and the substantial size of the building, it is expected that the demolition will take a few months to complete.

The Township is also in the process of identifying a qualified design consultant to assist in the planning and design of park and recreational improvements to the site. This process will include opportunities for public comment and input into a proposed master plan that we hope will be formally presented to the Board of Commissioners this coming fall (2022).

It is anticipated that, with the completion of demolition in the spring/summer and the completion of the master plan in the fall, construction of any approved improvements would not begin until the spring of 2023 at the earliest.

Willow Grove Interchange

For some time, the Township has recognized that the Willow Grove interchange of the Pennsylvania Turnpike accessed via southbound Easton Rd. (Rt. 611) needs upgrading. There are regular traffic backups on Easton Rd./Rt. 611 onto the Turnpike when traveling southbound. Sometimes traffic can back up as far up as Blair Mill Rd.

To address this problem, the Township took the initiative to work with the Pennsylvania Turnpike and the Pennsylvania Dept. of Transportation (Penn DOT) and applied for a grant to design the necessary improvements to this interchange. With

the assistance of Rep. Nancy Guenst and Sen. Maria Collett, the Township advocated aggressively for this project.

Last fall we were notified that the Township was awarded the necessary \$1.65 million to design the needed improvements at the interchange. Although this project will likely take many years to be built, this is a very important first step.

Farmstead Park Grants

Exciting things are happening in Farmstead Park, located at the intersection of Byberry and Orangemans Rds. This unique park has several historically significant buildings, playing fields, and attractive open space.

Over the past year, the Township has worked cooperatively with the Pennypack Ecological Restoration Trust and the Farmstead Alliance to develop a park improvement plan that includes significant restoration efforts on three historic structures, stormwater management improvements, the construction of a pedestrian pathway, and the reconstruction of the parking lot. The cost for all of these improvements is expected to total over \$950,000.

The Township, PERT, and the Farmstead Alliance working cooperatively, aggressively pursued grant funds to pay for these improvements and were happy to be awarded approximately \$880,000 in grant funds. The remaining approximately \$170,000 will be provided by the Township, and other organizations, in both cash and in-kind services. The grant funds are composed of the following sources:

- Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) \$335,000
- National Fish and Wildlife Foundation (NFWF) \$345,917
- Montgomery County (Montco. 2040) \$100,000
- Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission \$100,000

REAL ESTATE TAX OFFICE

Your 2022 County and Township Real Estate Tax Bill was mailed in February 2022. If you have not received it, please call our office at 267-607-1046 or 267-607-1047. Take some time to read the instructions on the bottom of the bill, as that useful information may answer your questions.

If you have moved and need to have your mailing address changed, we must have a written request to do so. Be sure to include the reason you need the address changed, and a phone number where you can be reached.

Your bill includes two copies. We need one copy to post your payment, and the second copy is for your records. If you would like a receipt, please present the **entire bill**. For those of you who wish to pay by mail and would like a receipt, enclose the entire bill and a stamped, self-addressed envelope. We will mark one copy as your paid receipt and return it to you.

The Real Estate Tax office is located on the first floor of the Township Building at 117 Park Avenue. Our office hours are 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. and 12:30 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. Please note that we do close from 12-12:30 p.m. for lunch.



UPPER MORELAND TOWNSHIP CODE ENFORCEMENT DEPARTMENT



Uniform Construction Code Update: Upper Moreland Township follows Act 45 of the Pa. Uniform Construction Code. The 2018 Edition of the ICC codes was adopted in February of 2022 for use under the UCC. For more information on Pa Act 45, please visit the Pa. Department of Labor & Industry website at www.dli.pa.gov/ucc/. Information on the ICC codes can be found at www.iccsafe.org/.

Construction Permits: Building codes allow us to rely on the safety of the structures around us in our everyday living. The requirement of construction permits allows the local code officials to administer the provisions of the code to ensure proper construction. If you are planning any kind of home remodeling project or thinking of retaining a contractor to do work for you, please keep these regulations in mind. Construction Permits are needed for all repairs, additions, and alterations to properties. This includes work done to roofs, siding, windows, fences, shed, both above- and in-ground pools, driveways, driveway aprons, and curbs, as well as interior projects in kitchens, bathrooms, and garages. Permits are not required for replacing gutters or windows of the same size unless a structural alteration is made. Permits are not required for painting, tree removal, or pruning. If you are unsure if a permit is required, please take the time to call the Code Enforcement Department at 215-659-3100 for assistance before beginning work. **Permits will only be issued once they have been reviewed for compliance with all local and applicable state regulations.** Fines can be issued for work begun prior to the issuance of the permits required. Permits are also needed for work on heating, air conditioning, and electrical systems (including electrical connections to swimming pools and ornamental ponds). **A registered master plumber must do all plumbing projects,** and the plumber must apply directly for the permits required.

Registration of Contractors is required according to the Home Improvement Consumer Protection Act of July 2009. All contractors performing home remodeling projects are required to be registered with the PA Attorney General's Office. A copy of state license and insurance certificate shall be submitted to UMT. Commercial contractors, new home builders, and master plumbers must still be licensed with Upper Moreland Township. Please contact the Upper Moreland Township Department of Code Enforcement for information on contractors. For additional information on the Act and to see if your contractor is registered with the state, please visit the Attorney General's website at www.attorneygeneral.gov.

Property Maintenance: Upper Moreland Twp. adopted the 2015 ICC Property Maintenance Code, which requires that all properties and structures be kept in good repair and maintained in a clean, safe, and sanitary condition. Please trim grass and weeds regularly and remember that growth in **excess** of twelve inches is prohibited. Depositing or blowing

of grass or other yard waste into the public right-of-way (roadway or sidewalk) is prohibited. Trash and debris may not be stored on properties at any time. It is also important to make sure that shrubs and trees located near streets do not obscure road signs from the view of motorists or pedestrians. Please prune landscaping to ensure that signs are clearly visible from a distance. Gutters and downspouts should be checked to ensure they are free of debris and properly secured. Please contact a professional contractor specializing in this field. Storm windows, weather stripping, and exterior doors should be properly sealed to prevent unwanted drafts and heat loss. Please visit the U.S. Dept. of Energy's website for more information (www.energy.gov).

Home Occupations: Residents may operate a business or office from their property, subject to certain restrictions. However, only people living in the dwelling may operate the business or office. No outside storage of material related to the home occupation is permitted. If you are interested in running a business or office from your home, please contact the Code Enforcement Department first, to ensure your plans are in keeping with the Township's guidelines and to obtain the required annual use registration permit. Residences used for in-home day care must meet all Township regulations, including a maximum of six children (four infants) at any one time and be inspected annually by the Code Enforcement Officer and Fire Marshal. All day care providers must reside in the dwelling. All home occupations, proprietorships, partnerships, corporations, limited liability companies, and other entities operating in the Township must also register with the Township's Business Tax Office before beginning operations.

Swimming Pools capable of holding in excess of 24 inches of water require a permit from the Code Enforcement Department. All filter and circulation equipment must be wired in accordance with the 2014 National Electric Code (N.E.C.). All swimming pools must be surrounded by a permanent barrier that is at least four feet high with a self-closing, self-latching gate. Requirement hand-outs are available at the Code Enforcement Office.

Swimming Pool Drainage should be discharged into the sanitary sewer system. Water may be drained into the storm water system **if it has first been de-chlorinated.** Township regulations prohibit directing water discharge from swimming pools onto the property of another person **without** their consent.

Public Nuisances (noise, etc.): The Township often receives complaints from residents concerning inoperable vehicles, excessive noise, and construction work taking place before 7:00 a.m. and after 10:00 p.m. Residents are reminded that **all vehicles** must be operable and have a current registration and valid inspection sticker unless stored in a completely

enclosed building or garage (car covers are not compliant). These are but a few examples of **"public nuisance"** actions that interfere with the repose, health, safety, or life of others. Upper Moreland has adopted regulations prohibiting nuisances such as these, which affect our residents' quality of life.

Portable Storage Units: The Board of Commissioners adopted regulations for portable storage units, dumpsters and construction trailers placed on any parcel. In addition to the permit requirement, there is a limit on the number of units and time for which they can be placed on the parcel. No units may be placed in the street without specific authorization from the Code Enforcement Office. Please contact the Code Enforcement Office for information and permitting requirements prior to placing these units on your property.

Recreation Vehicles longer than twenty feet must have an annual permit from the Code Enforcement Department if stored on your property for more than two weeks.

Spring/Summer Home Preparation Tips:

- Have roof flashing, caulking, and shingles inspected in preparation for spring storms.
- Inspect caulking around windows, doors, and any openings into the home.
- Change your ceiling fan's direction.
- Clean your dryer vents.
- Check insulation around windows and doors.
- Repair HVAC filters regularly.
- Run the bathroom exhaust fan during showers.
- Switch to LED bulbs where appropriate.
- Plant a shade tree next to your outside air conditioning unit.
- Consider installing an attic fan or vent.

HOUSEHOLD TRASH COLLECTION

Regular household trash is collected once each week. Please call the Public Works Department at 215-659-4070, Monday through Friday between 6:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. if you are unsure of your pickup day. Trash containers should be placed at the curb by 6:30 a.m. on your collection day, but not more than 12 hours beforehand. Empty cans must be removed within 12 hours of collection. All trashcans must be covered, weigh less than 50 pounds when full, and be no larger than 50 gallons in capacity. Lids must completely detach, not just pivot open, and should have house numbers. Trash placed in boxes or drums will not be collected. If you are placing trash bags curbside, bags must not be more than 20 pounds when full. Garbage must be drained and bagged to delay decomposition. The Public Works Department does not collect materials related to the demolition, repair, or construction of buildings. This restriction includes, but is not limited to, concrete, plaster, wood, drywall, dirt, fencing, and landscape ties. Homeowners must make arrangements for the disposal of these items. If you are planning on moving and have a lot of trash, extra volume must be spread out over several pickups. **Bedding: Box Springs and Mattresses must be either wrapped in plastic or put into a mattress bag.**

If your trash and/or recycling collection is cancelled due to inclement weather, please call the Public Works Department at 215-659-4070 or log onto the Township Web site (www.uppermoreland.org) to find out when your next pickup will occur.



Many residents have trash cans unacceptable for curbside collection. Regulations limit the size of trash cans to 50-gallon capacity and 50-pound weight limit. Lids must completely detach, not just pivot open. These regulations are in place to protect service personnel from injury and thereby make the best use of tax dollars.

GLASS, CAN, PLASTIC, AND PAPER RECYCLING RECYCLING PROGRAMS

Recyclable materials are collected the same day as your regular household trash. Glass bottles, aluminum and tin cans, #'s 1 through 7 plastics, paper goods, cardboard boxes, and yard waste are included in Upper Moreland Township's recycling program. **RECYCLING OF THESE MATERIALS IS MANDATORY IN UPPER MORELAND TOWNSHIP.**



Due to automation of recycling collection – ALL recyclables (with the exception of yard waste) must now be mixed together ***and placed in the 95-gallon recycling containers that are provided by the Township.*** This includes glass, bottles, plastics numbered 1-7, tin and aluminum cans, ***AND*** also paper and cardboard. Cardboard must be cut to fit into the can. Please do not stuff the can too full, as it will not completely empty. Break cardboard down. You may no longer set cardboard out separately; all cardboard must be placed in the container. Containers are the property of Upper Moreland Township and must remain with the property if you move.

Glass, Can, Plastic, and Paper Recycling: Unbroken glass bottles, clean aluminum and tin cans and #'s 1 through 7 plastics, newspapers, computer paper, brown bags, magazines, junk mail, office paper, phone books, paperboard cartons or boxes (not wax lined), including those from beverages, six packs, and those used to hold pizza or other fast food items, may be mixed together and placed curbside in the recycling containers that are provided by the Township. **NO OTHER CONTAINERS WILL BE ACCEPTED.** No trash, cigarettes, or food/drink residue should be in bottles. No plate glass, light bulbs, mirrors, or broken glass is included in recycling (put in regular trash). Cans that contained paint, fuel, aerosol spray, oil or other hazardous materials cannot be collected.

EXCLUDED: Styrofoam (includes egg cartons, clamshell containers, plates, cups, meat trays, and packing peanuts), plastic films or bags, PVC pipes, CD/DVDs, coffee cup lids, straws, plastic cutlery, plastic 6-pack rings, waxed paper, waxed cardboard, and coat hangers.

Proper Placement of Recycling Cans: in order for the recycling can to be accessible for the recycling truck, please do the following: place cans with the metal bar facing out into the street, and place cans three feet from cars, poles, trash, or other obstacles.

YARD/BULK/MISCELLANEOUS COLLECTION

DISPOSAL OF YARD WASTE

Leaves, grass clippings, and other yard waste will be collected each Monday. Only brown, 30-gallon biodegradable yard waste bags will be accepted. Bags should weigh less than 50 pounds and be placed at the curb by 6:30 a.m., but not more than 12 hours beforehand. The Public Works Department **will not accept** bags that contain dirt, edgings, wood chips, mulch, stump grindings, rocks, or household trash as these items can cause damage to our recycling equipment and composting program. There is **no limit** to the number of bags that may be placed curbside for collection.



BRUSH and BRANCHES

In addition to bagged yard waste, brush and branches are also picked up each Monday. Brush and branches should be tied into bundles with manila rope or jute twine. Bundles should weigh less than 50 lbs. and be up to four feet in length and two feet in width. **No more than 6 bundles** should be placed curbside for pickup on each collection day.

CHANGES TO 2022 YARD WASTE COLLECTION

Due to holiday scheduling changes, there will be **NO** yard waste collections on the following Mondays:

April 18 • May 30 • July 4 • September 5 • November 14 • November 28 • December 26

Yard waste not being picked up on the dates above will be picked up on the following Monday.

FREE COMPOST AVAILABLE!!!!

Recycling yard waste collected in Upper Moreland Township creates compost for gardens and plantings. Compost is provided at no cost. Please bring your own containers and take as much as you like. For information, please call the Public Works Department at 215-659-4070.

ELECTRONICS DISPOSAL

Electronics are part of the recycling program. A permit is required for the disposal of household electronics. "Electronics" include but are not limited to TV's up to 50", Stereos, VCR's, DVD players, computers, keyboards, monitors, and microwaves. Permits can be obtained from the receptionist's office at the Township Building, 8:30 am-4:30 pm, Monday - Friday. Permit fees range from \$1.00 to \$20.00. **Please note: Televisions over 50" are the owner's responsibility.** Once a permit is obtained, if the item(s) have "disappeared" from in front of your home before 6:00 am on the scheduled pickup date, call the Public Works Department at 215-659-4070 to cancel the pickup. If the pickup is cancelled by 6:30 am, the permit fee will be refunded in full.



DISPOSAL OF CARPETING

Rugs and padding will be picked up on your regular trash day. Rugs and padding must be cut to 4-foot widths, then rolled and tied securely. Each section should weigh less than 20 pounds. **Limit 1 room per pickup.**

SAFE DISPOSAL OF HOUSEHOLD SHARPS

Place sharp household objects in a rigid, strong plastic or metal container with a screw-on or tightly secured cap, such as a laundry detergent bottle, or use a purchased Sharps Container. Reinforce the cap with heavy-duty tape. Mark clearly and noticeably on the outside of the container **"Do Not Recycle"** and **"Household Sharps."** Sharps include medical needles, knitting needles, and knives, among other items.

DISPOSAL OF HOUSEHOLD PAINT

Latex-based paint will be accepted in your regular trash. Paint must be dried, and the lid must be removed. Place paint cans next to your trash cans. Oil-based paints must be taken to a Montgomery County Household Hazardous Waste Collection site. For more information on the MONTCO Hazardous Waste Collection, call 610-278-3618.

ARE YOU MOVING?

To better serve the Township, the Public Works Department requests that residents who are moving, and have a large volume of trash, spread it out over a period of time. Please try to dispose of all trash prior to your settlement date. Please call the Public Works Department at 215-659-4070 if you are unsure about what items can be placed curbside.



BULK ITEMS

The Public Works Department assists residents by providing a special service to remove **metal** items such as appliances, grills, lawn mowers, exercise equipment, etc. A pickup for these items can be scheduled by obtaining a bulk pickup permit from the receptionist's office at the Township Building. The minimum fee for a **bulk pickup permit** is \$15.00; the final cost will depend on the type, size, and number of items to be picked up. Please call the Public Works Department at 215-659-4070 if you are unsure if an item requires a permit. *Please remember that once a permit is issued, a collection date is scheduled. If you find that the item(s) have "disappeared" from in front of your home before 6:00 a.m. on the scheduled pickup date, please call the Public Works Department by 6:30 a.m. to cancel the collection. If the pickup is cancelled by 6:30 a.m., the permit fee will be refunded in full.*

Benjamin Lay was a small, fearless Quaker, conducting dramatic protests against slavery in the early days of Philadelphia. He confronted Philadelphia's wealthy Quakers demanding that they free their slaves and boycott items produced by slave labor. Lay published a scathing book, printed by Benjamin Franklin, that attacked many prominent Quakers.

If our **April dinner** can be held, our speaker will be Neill Hartley who is a professional actor, director, and educator. He had principal roles in *The Sixth Sense*, *First Freedom* (a PBS documentary) and in seasons two, three and four of the Netflix series, *House of Cards*. For over seven years, Neill was seen on QVC as a spokesperson for two national companies. He works regularly in industrial and voice-over projects and has appeared in regional and national commercials for PA Lottery, PA Tourism, Auto Lenders, Benari Jewelers and TaxSlayer.com. Neill's presentation will be on the Spirit of Lindbergh, with him appearing in character as the famous aviator.

Our **May 24** program will be presented by Michael S. Jesberger, an independent military historian who specializes in the American Revolution and Civil War time periods. He is renowned for his engaging and passionate presentation style, whether providing formal lectures, living history presentations or tours of historic sites. He will be covering the 1913 Gettysburg reunion attended by 53,000 Civil War veterans. The story of planning and building such a facility to handle and house 53,000 elderly veterans is remarkable.

Personal Safety Precautions

With the recent uptick of armed robberies and car jackings in the Delaware Valley region, the Upper Moreland Police Department offers the following safety tips for residents and visitors to avoid becoming a victim of these crimes:

ALWAYS CONCEAL: All valuables should be concealed at all times. Cash, cell phones, and purses are highly desirable items for thieves. They see it, they want it. In order to be safe, treat your cell phone and any other valuable item like cash: don't let anyone know you have it.

REPORT SUSPICIOUS PERSONS: Call 9-1-1 to report suspicious persons. The police want to hear from you, and you could prevent a crime! When calling, provide as much information as possible, including the time you noticed the person, the clothing worn, the shoes worn, and the manner in which the person walked, or if they are using a vehicle.

THE STREET: Always be aware of your surroundings, with particular interest to individuals near and around you. If someone looks suspicious or makes you feel uneasy, avoid that person. Go inside a store or business if necessary. If you must make a call while you are walking, go to a safe, public place, like a store. Make your call, then conceal your phone the way you would conceal your cash before going back to the street.

YOUR VEHICLE: When leaving your vehicle, lock it and close the windows. Take your key. Don't leave items inside the vehicle, even if you think they look like trash. The items may still look attractive to a thief. When you get in the vehicle, close and lock the doors immediately. Keep the doors locked and the windows rolled up. Avoid making cell phone calls while driving. If you must make a call, pull over at a populated location, convenience store, shopping center, and keep an eye on who is near your vehicle.

WHEN YOU ARE AT HOME: When you are exiting or unloading your vehicle, when walking from your vehicle to your home, or when spending time in your front yard, follow these precautions:

- Be cautious of anyone on the street who makes you feel uneasy.
- If you view such a person and are in the front yard, quickly go inside and lock the doors.
- If you are in a vehicle, stay in the vehicle with locked doors and windows.
- Use a cell phone to call someone to escort you inside, or drive away and call 9-1-1.
- Never, ever open your door to anyone you do not know.

THE ATM: Use ATMs in well lit, populated areas. Store and bank ATMs during the day are recommended. Scan the area before using the ATM. If you see a person loitering in the area for no apparent reason, go to another location. If you see something strange during your transaction, push cancel, take your card, and leave the area. During and after the transaction, be alert. You'll have cash in hand making you a possible target. Scan the area. Leave immediately. If you suspect danger, promptly enter the nearest store or building and call 9-1-1.

Overall Personal Safety General Tips:

- Park your vehicle in well-lit areas closest to the establishment or store that you are patronizing.
- Always keep your cell phone readily accessible to call 9-1-1.
- Never stop for stranded motorists or pedestrians. Note the location and call 9-1-1 for the police department to respond and investigate.
- Trust your instincts. If you feel that something is wrong, leave the area and call 9-1-1 immediately. Do not rationalize the incident!

Whenever in doubt call 9-1-1, so we may investigate your observations and concerns!

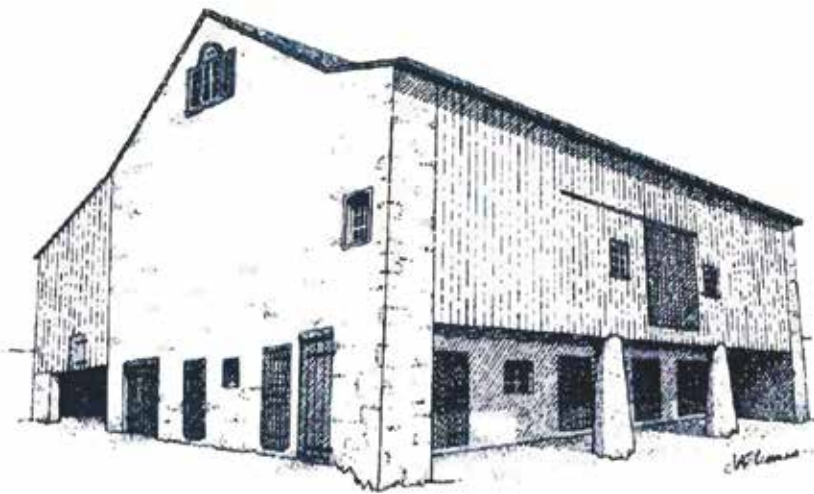


Reducing the amount of lawn in your yard and increasing the number of native trees, shrubs, and wildflowers is becoming increasingly important for birds, pollinators, and other wildlife. As more and more wooded and meadow areas get turned into housing developments and malls, there are fewer and fewer places for birds and other wildlife to survive. Your lawn also costs you more time and money than native plants. A lawn must be mowed, and many people also add fertilizers

and pesticides to their lawns. These chemical compounds not only cost you money, but are dangerous for beneficial insects and stream organisms. Since most of the rain that falls on a lawn runs off into the storm drain and then into the nearest stream, this is a significant problem. You can make your yard into a safe oasis for you, birds, and pollinators by simply planting large beds of native plants such as milkweeds, coneflowers, black-eyed Susan, phlox, beebalm, asters, goldenrods, red osier dogwood, and many more. Choose a mix of plants so something is in bloom during each season. These plants provide nectar for butterflies, seeds for birds, and caterpillars for parent birds to feed their young. These native plants don't need water once they are established, or pesticides or mowing. The resources here will help you decide what plants you might want to use to start helping birds and pollinators in your yard.

UPPER MORELAND HISTORICAL COMMISSION

To say "I love what I do" is an understatement. Being on the Upper Moreland Historical Commission, I get to see historical buildings, learn about local hauntings, and help preserve my township's history. I recently had the opportunity to interview our newly elected officers. Below you will find some snippets of these interviews. The full manuscripts (including ghost stories) can be found on our Facebook page.

Jacqueline Cherepinsky: Why should people continue learning about their township's history?

Susan Worth-LaManna (President): History gives us all a perspective on where we have been, which helps to build a community vision for the future. Knowing that Willow Grove was an important stagecoach stop between Philadelphia and New York allows residents to understand the rise of the Red Lion Inn, the Mineral Springs, and the Fountain House downtown, which led to our growth in the 1800's.

Jacqueline: Any advice to homeowners in Upper Moreland who live in historic homes?

Udo Maron (Vice President): The purpose of the historical commission is to offer advice or comments to people who own these historic homes. The commission exists

as a resource, and if homeowners need assistance with research, the commission is here to help.

Jacqueline: Do you think there could be historical secrets here, like in the film *National Treasure*?

Natalie Baine-Schliskey (Secretary): Do you remember that scene where Nicolas Cage's character pulls out a brick from the wall and reveals a secret pair of glasses created by Benjamin Franklin? In our Cottage House, we have a wooden plank in the center of the stone wall that pulls out exactly like that.

Jacqueline: I heard your home might be haunted. Is there any truth to that rumor?

Bonnie MacDonald (Treasurer): My home was built as a wedding present from the parents of a young woman and her fiancé. Unfortunately, he was killed in the Revolution, and she spent the rest of her days pining away for him in their home. The ghost of that woman made her first appearance to warn me about sparks in the wall. I had a medium channeling the foreboding words, saying "it's going to burn our house." I called an electrician to come out and he took a cover panel from the wall and immediately saw sparking. She saved my life.

UPPER MORELAND HUMAN RELATIONS COMMISSION

Residents of Upper Moreland Township strive to keep our community one we can be proud of. As a result, the Upper Moreland Township Board of Commissioners declared it to be the public policy of the Township to foster equality and equal opportunity for all citizens regardless of actual or perceived race, color, age, religious creed, ancestry, sex, national origin, handicap, sexual orientation, or gender identity or expression in all matters affecting employment, housing and commercial property, and public accommodation, and to safeguard the right of all persons to remain free of discrimination or discriminatory practices. The Upper Moreland Township Board of Commissioners recognizes the inherent dignity and worth of all people and through Ordinance no. 1696 prohibits discrimination in housing, employment, and public accommodations. The UMHRC provides a venue for all citizens of Upper Moreland Township to address potential grievances. The UMHRC has been organized and is in the process of training its members in accordance with guidelines set forth by the Pennsylvania Human Relations Commission and the Pennsylvania Human Relations Act. The UMHRC is preparing education and community outreach programs and materials in order to inform Upper Moreland Township citizens about its purposes, responsibilities, and processes in serving our community.

Dedication to our common goal of community, equality, and equal protection under the law can be achieved through continued learning and education about our community and the needs we all share. Community input to reach the goals all of us share for our community are welcome and requested.
